

FORUM: Junior Security Council

QUESTION OF: The question of addressing women's involvement in global politics

MAIN-SUBMITTER: Belgium

CO-SUBMITTER: USA, Niger, Dominican Republic, Estonia, and Indonesia

Junior Security Council,

Seeking equality among men and women,

Recognising that the global average of women in national assemblies is only 24.3 percent,

Appreciating the efforts made by the UN, UN Women, UNDP and Politics for Women to further help solve this issue,

Reminding that The UN Economic and social council resolution 1990 called on governments, political parties, trade unions, and other representative groups to adopt a 30 percent minimum proportion of women in leadership positions, with a view to achieving equal representation,

Alerting that women have been facing violence in countries like Pakistan for voting or being a political leader,

Aware of the people's dissatisfactions,

Encourages nations to work hand in hand to help resolve this issue,

1. Prioritizes political education for girls and women in all countries for future women politicians in means such as but not limited to:
 - a. Collaborating with organizations like UN Women to host a lesson on what to do and what not to do in the political world
 - b. Creating a descriptive guide about the political world that justifies the existence of women in the political world;
2. Further recommends more women to join global politics by:
 - a. Breaking stereotypes and eliminating barriers that bind women:
 - i. Financially stabilizing both genders of politicians for campaigns and elections, so as to prevent from any candidates having an advantage, and to increase transparency of the selection itself
 - ii. Anyone who grants more financial support will be jailed for not complying to the rules
 - b. Providing of services that women would need such as:
 - i. More female-suitable sanitation facilities in order to respond to the increased amount of staffs who are female
 - ii. Taking reference from some work offices, a daycare service for the women's children if they do not have a place or time to care for, so as to let the other staff watch over their kids while the women work;
3. Encourages more countries to set their gender quota law to 50% as this will help:
 - a. Balance the gender percentage of national parliaments
 - b. Have political equality for both genders in means to allow for more unique perspectives when solving an issue, where both genders will be able to give opinions on and discuss with, so that the solution outcome will not be sexually biased and citizens will cast more informed votes;

4. Draws attention to protecting female candidates, political leaders, and voters and creating a safe environment for them in means such as but not limited to:
 - a. Prevent from getting hatred from the males or even from the political world, as this balancing out of parliament is merely done to create a more generous and fair world as well as solving the gender inequality
 - b. Reminds member states to provide not only opportunity but to also provide a better facility and working environment so that women will not be sexually assaulted or be harassed men in ways such as but not limited to:
 - i. Lecturing or providing education to the males about the opposite gender and how women feel when they are sexually harassed,
 - ii. Teaching to look out for if females are feeling uncomfortable;
5. Urges well-known medias, organizations, government officials, influencers and more to raise awareness worldwide of the importance of women in global politics, as well as give people access to information about how the gender quota will bring benefits to the world by:
 - a. Bringing an individual or representative to provide a speech during assemblies to:
 - i. Promote a positive vision of women's in politics
 - ii. Bring interest to advocates of gender quotas
 - b. Having local government authorities required to promote this issue systematically and purposefully
 - c. Encouraging close collaboration with the media and journalists by including discussions
 - d. Using popular social media platforms such as Twitter to let the younger generation put this issue in their minds:
 - i. A special type of hashtag/thread will be created, that will project and inform what this issue is about in short amount of time
 - ii. The company will remind the users to share their opinion on this issue;
6. Calls for all countries to sign conventions and treaties such as but not limited to:
 - a. The Convention on the Political Rights of Women (CEDAW)
 - b. United Nations Development Programme (UNDP)
 - c. Welfare Development Plan
 - d. All countries will have to sign the 50% gender quota law;
7. Urges more governments to provide a better opportunity for women to get in the cabinets by enforcing gender quotas in the workplace to provide different perspectives by handpicking certain amounts of females from a certain list by the government/country through interviews and citizen voting, and the head of state will be able to review the finalists during a meeting with the staff members who have been involved in the interviews, for final check.
